## Outlook Good Auto Technology I: Skills in high demand

ccording to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, careers in the auto maintenance field should increase by an average of 17% and "Job opportunities for qualified job seekers should be very good."

-- which is precisely one of the reasons firstyear teacher and industry leader Kevin Morris decided to restart the Auto Service Technology I course at his alma mater.

"My driving force for being here is as an employer. Maybe I could have a positive influence to get better students involved in this as a career choice," Morris said.

Morris knows what he is talking about since he owns and operates his own business,"Precision Service, Auto and Truck Repair" in Bluffton for nearly 20 years, and teaches similar classes at

Ivy Tech.

"This is a most indepth class," says senior Ryan Elmore. Following graduation, Elmore has already chosen to study Ag. Equipment Repair.

Today, 15 members of the class are repairing brakes and replacing brake lines on two of the students' own vehicles: a bright red El Camino and a 1974 light blue International.

Junior Justin Branstrator took the class because he thought it "sounded like fun."

"I'm going to hopefully continue to the next level when they add it next year," Branstrator said. "Then I'll be able to fix my cars myself."

"When they walk out of here, my goal is that the students will have the skills and knowledge to gain an entry level position," Morris said.
